

Over 4000 years of human history.

Clearly, Stuston, by whatever name it has been called, has been the site of multiple occupations and activities over four millennia.

The archives of Suffolk Heritage Explorer give over 70 recorded finds throughout the village.

Given that the clay “ridge” our side of the Waveney would have offered a reasonably safe route for hunting and later agriculture there have been several finds that continue to add to the history of the village and indeed the County.

Between 4,000 – 2,300 years B.C.

Neolithic man was in this area, with flints and other hunting tools being found in various locations.

Bronze Age man (2,350 – 701 B.C.)

Was here too, engaging in agriculture and drainage together with evidence of kilns and pottery by “Beaker People” alongside the A143 and on the Golf Course which indicates that there was suitable clay to be worked.

Don't forget that East Anglia was the home of the Iceni People – Queen Boudica & all that, with her palace at Thetford, it's highly likely that this area was also farmed intensively by them too.
